# **NEW CITATION RULES ACCORDING TO ISO 690 2021**

### **CITATION SYSTEMS**

The standard introduces two new citation systems (marked in bold):

- 1. Harvard System (Name/Date System)
- 2. Numerical system
- 3. Name tag system
- 4. Continuous notes system
- 5. Connected (implied) system

# HARVARD SYSTEM (NAME AND DATE SYSTEM)

### Changes

In bibliographical references, the **date** after the first entry (creator or title) is given **in round brackets:** BURCHARD, J. E., (1965). How humanists use a library. In: C. E. OVERHAGE and J. R. HARMAN (eds.). *in Intrex*, pp. 41-87.

INTERNATIONAL ORGANIZATION FOR STANDARDIZATION (ISO), (2019). ISO 8601-1:2019, Date and time - representations for informazion interchange - Part 1: Basic rules.

### The in-text citation will take the form:

Text, text, text... (Burchard 1965) - in the case of paraphrase "Text, text... " (Burchard 1965, p. 5) - in the case of the quotation

#### **GENERAL RULES**

#### **LANGUAGE**

Most of the data for the bibliographic reference is given in the language of **the cited** document, as it is taken from the cited document. However, there are exceptions for data that are not taken directly from the information source but are added. These include: the conjunction 'and' between the last and penultimate author (creator), the range of pages, the format and type of medium, the role of the creators, the availability, the indication of citation. We record these data in the language of the **citing document**. As stated in ISO 690, "references in a publication should follow the language and font of the publication to enable the reader to understand the references."

# **CREATORS**

• If the primary creator is not the author of the text, but has a major role in the creation of the information source, we will add their role in round brackets, which can be recorded in full or in abbreviated form:


SLOVÁK, Adam (comp.) or VANEK, Peter (composer).

• Multiple primary creators are written by listing all but the first in direct object (names are separated by semicolons):

DVORSKÁ, Petra; Anna BARTOVÁ and Zuzana BELICOVÁ

- If there are up to 5 primary creators, we need to list all of them.
- If there are 6 or more creators, we will list the first and the abbreviation et al.: DVORSKÁ, Petra et al.
- If we use initials, we separate them with a period and a space: BURCHARD, J. E.
- If the primary creator is an institution, we record it with the versal: SLOVAK ACADEMY OF SCIENCES.
- The **names of secondary creators** (translators, illustrators, etc.) are always given **in direct verbiage** and with the role in round brackets:





Peter VESELÝ (translator)

The secondary creator is not a mandatory entry, but in some cases it is appropriate to include it for clarity.

#### LINKS

- The names of information sources as units are in italics.
- For sections from traditional information sources, we italicize the **name of the host information source**:

- For parts from online information sources, we follow the following steps:
  - o If the part is available directly, write the part name in italics:

Example: a section (paper) in an online periodical available directly:

o **If the section is not directly accessible**, the name of the host information resource will be in italics:

Example: a section (paper) in an online proceedings available only through the host resource: ŠKOVIEROVÁ, Angela, (2021). Samuel Rochotsky's book collection and its fate. In. *Studia Bibliographica Posoniensia*. Online. University Library of Bratislava, 2021, pp. 27-44. Available at: https://www.ulib.sk/files/sk/publikacie-ukb/studia-bibliographica-posoniensia/spb2021.pdf. [accessed 2023-03-02].

• For information sources that are untitled, e.g. personal correspondence, photographs, etc., we add an appropriate title in square brackets, e.g. [Lienka].

# **PUBLISHING DATA AND DATE OF PUBLICATION**

- The place of issue is not a **mandatory** information.
- The name of the publisher **is mandatory** except when citing parts (articles) from periodicals. For articles from periodicals, the name of the publisher is only given if the name of the periodical is not sufficient to identify it, there is no key name of the periodical, or there are several periodicals with the same name. In this case, we can also use the ISSN, DOI and place of publication to identify the journal completely accurately.
- If the publisher is not known, we indicate [s.n.].
- In the case of multiple publishers, we can list all of them, but it is not necessary.
- The year of issue is a **mandatory figure**. If we derive it from another source, we put it in square brackets [1980]; if the year of publication cannot be traced, we put [s.a.]
- If there are multiple publishers with different year of publication, the entry is as follows: Duckworth, 1999; Cornell University Press, 2000.

### PARTS OF INFORMATION RESOURCES

- By parts of information sources we mean contributions in information sources, e.g. articles in journals or proceedings.
- "In:" can be omitted for journal articles, but is mandatory for parts of monographic sources (e.g. proceedings). It may also be used if bibliographic references need to be machine-readable.



- Numbering is the indication of the year and number of the series (journal) in the language of the cited document, i.e. as it appears in the cited document. For accurate identification, it is supplemented by the year of publication and the range of pages. It takes the form:
- about the year. 6 (1999), No. 5, pp. 5-10
- o vol. 6 (1999), no. 5, pp. 5-10
- o Jg. 6 (1999), No 7, pp. 5-10
- o 6, 1999, 5, 5 10 due to the ambiguity of the data, we do not recommend using this form. (We give an example for a journal in Slovak, English and German, if the language of the citing document is Slovak. Therefore, the page range indication is in Slovak)
- The numbering of the series is recorded after the comma after the series title or after the source type designation after the period if it is an online version:
- STIEG, M. F., (1981.) The information needs of historians. *College and Research Libraries*, vol. 42 (1981), no. 6, pp. 549-560.
- STRINGER, John A. et al, (2005). Reduction of RF-induced sample heating with ascroll coil resonator structure for solid-state NMR probes. *Journal of Magnetic Resonance*. Online. Vol. 173 (March 2005), no. 1, pp. 40-48. Available at: https://doi.org/10.1016/j.jmr.2004.11.015. [accessed 2021-09-09].
- For newspaper articles, the numbering is replaced by the exact date the article was published, e.g. 2023-02-14.

# **AVAILABILITY AND CITATION DATE**

- For online resources, specify Available at: and hyperlink as https or https URI, e.g. Available at: https://www.euroekonom.sk/informacie-udaje-data/.
- URL shortening is not recommended.
- Information resources that are best accessed via the service should also be noted as such: Available on: Twitter, @carterjwm.
- A persistent identifier (DOI) or a permanent link should be used when possible.
- If access to an online resource requires a login or is subject to a fee, this should be indicated as a note, e.g.: Access requires a login. Licensed resource.
- The date of citation/display/access is mandatory only for so-called dynamic online information resources, i.e. resources that change (update, revise) their content or add to it (= continuing resources). The standard provides several options for entry:
- o [Accessed 2022-01-14]
- o [citation date 2022-01-14]
- o [viewed 2022-01-14]

# **FURTHER DATA**


• The format and type of the source are given without square brackets, with a capital letter after the document title, e.g. Online, Looseleaf, Paperback, TV Series, Audiobook, Kindle e-book, App, PDF, Statistical dataset, Statistical analysis program, Cartographic image, Computer dataset/Dataset, Notated music, Played Music, Spoken Word, Libretto, Audiocassette, Audiodisc (CD), Videodisc (DVD), Gramophone Record (LP), Computer Disk, Microfiche Cassette, Film Cassette, Videocassette, Film Reel, Object, Static Image, etc.

The above can also be combined, e.g. PDF; online.

### We do not use if it is a traditional text document.

- The format and type of the source are given after the title; in the case of a part, after the name of the host source,
- e.g. ONDRIŠ, Peter. Information literacy. Library. Online. ...





- The issue indication is mandatory only if it is not the first issue.
- ISBN and ISSN are not mandatory data (in UNIZA environment they are recorded)
- A bibliographic reference **always ends with a full stop**, even if the last entry is the availability of the online resource.
- If the cited information source is an annotation, translation, commentary, arrangement, adaptation, revision, review, critique, substitute (substitution in another form, e.g. facsimile, physical substitute, digital substitute, summary), performance (realization of the artwork), the indication "relation" is also obligatory. It is indicated by a title followed by a reference to the related work in compound brackets { }. The relation is the last entry of the bibliographic reference or precedes the display date in the case of online resources. GARDNER, Martin (ed.), (1999). *The Annotated Alice*. W. W. Norton & company, 1999. Annotated at: {CARROLL, Lewis. Alice's Adventures in Wonderland. 1865}.

#### **INFORMATION RESOURCES AS A WHOLE**

Monographs, monographic publications, e-books and audiobooks

Primary creator. *Title*. Format; type of source. Issue. Secondary creator. Publisher(s), year of publication. Date of update/revision. Access. [date accessed].

The first edition need not be mentioned in the bibliographical reference.

The number of pages is not mandatory.

In place of the year of publication, we indicate the entire span of publication of the series as a whole; in the case of discontinued publication, e.g. 1990 - 2003; in the case of continuing publication, we indicate e.g. 1998 -

A website is a comprehensive set of web pages, a webpage is a separate page of a website. When citing a website, we indicate "Online" as the format and source type; when citing the entire website, we indicate "Website". In the case of information resources available only through the web archive, we also indicate the date of archiving after the access: [archived 2021-02-14].

Primary creator. The *name of the website* or the *name of the website*. Format; type of resource. System requirements. Date of update/revision. Access to web archive. [Scope or date and time of archiving]. Access. [date viewed].




